Transformation of Services Continues Despite Delay of De-Institutionalization Court Battles

Excerpt from Community Living Leaders Oct. 25, 2005 - Craig Anderson

While declaring his ultimate goal is the elimination of waiting lists for those receiving disability supports, Ontario's Community and Social Services Deputy Minister promised to continue to "vigorously and aggressively" defend the closing of regional institutions.

During a recent meeting with the executive committee of Community Living Ontario, Kevin Costante added that

significant changes to ODSP funding could come in early 2006, adding that certain "silly" provisions (for example, on ODSP a single person can only make \$160 a month before the funding is reduced) could possibly be scrapped.

ODSP funding structures have been heavily criticized by families for acting as a disincentive to full participation in
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Lunch Meeting in Legislature

On Monday October 17, 2005 a group of five people from Community Living Peterborough enjoyed a lunch meeting with MPP Jeff Leal at Queen's Park in Toronto.

The group including Lynda Nairn, Barb Anderson, Gord Herd, Graham Sheldon and Dianne Austin were hosted by MPP Jeff Leal to lunch in the Members dining room. As Gord

put it, "we wanted to talk about some of the issues affecting people in Peterborough".

Throughout the lunch meeting, the group talked about the need for an increase of the Ontario Disability Support Pension (ODSP) for people, of their involvement in the Kiwanis Aktion Group and the fact that they raise money to buy teddy

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employment and subsequently in the community, keeping its recipients in an impoverished position. Developing flexible, individualized funding structures is one of the crucial steps in transforming disability services in the province, said Costante.

"One of the things that we are increasingly hearing, particularly from young parents is that they want to manage the money themselves," said Costante.

"And frankly, if we can give families more money then they can be healthier and perhaps better support the individual in the community or in their own home. We're just trying to do what's best. We think we've had a wildly successful program in SSAH funding and we want to build on that," said Costante. Costante promised a "landmark" decision by early 2006.

One of the ways this alteration will be made is through transferring funding duties to the federal government, said Costante. By having the feds shoulder 30 per cent of current ODSP cases, roughly \$600

million will be freed to spend on improving and expanding current provincial disability supports.

As the spring federal budget is likely to carry an announcement of another sizeable surplus, Costante added that "there is no better time to strike."

"If there were federal dollars given to Ontario to invest in disability supports, we would obviously want to deal with a host of needs in developmental services, and that includes helping senior parents, increasing funding to SSAH, helping the budgets of agencies, and more intensive supports in general. As well, as a Ministry, we have other areas that require new funding as well – the deaf/blind population has similar gaps in services. And a lot of people have talked to us about one of the biggest gaps in disability services – transportation. We might think of using some of this money to see if we can improve transportation services for the disabled," he said.

Developing more coherent assessment tools in order to

People First, *Peterborough Chapter* is a self advocacy group involving individuals who have been negatively labeled with an intellectual disability.

The Chapter is led by a dynamic Executive Board of Directors and supported by 30 members from the Peterborough community. The group works in partnership with Community Living Peterborough, however, People First is independent and self-governing.

Community Development is a priority to the Peterborough Chapter. Members play an

active vital roll by educating the community about the Strengths, Abilities, and Rights of people with intellectual disabilities.

The Chapters most recent advocacy work involved supporting the YWCA's Week Without Violence at Sir Sandford Fleming College, Rallying at Queen's Park for the Walk Wheel and Ride for Dignity Campaign, and speaking at this years Take Back the Night.

determine needed funding is also critical, said Costante, noting the current persistent difficulty in assigning cost needs per individual.

Dealing with the class action suits facing the Ministry over its slated closure in 2009 of three institutions has been the biggest impediment to a more thorough effort in transforming services, said Costante.

Although he claimed his Ministry's full support for the closure, he offered words of warning for optimism regarding verdicts and the inevitable round of appeals the trials are likely to produce.

"The verdict might end up being a decision on whether the government has a right to close the facilities. Governments have been prevented from closing things before, so you never know. And this scenario – government against families - is not always a good one to assure

an outcome in our favour."

Although many of the local Community Living executive directors and Ontario executive committee members present were presently fully immersed in the radical changes and burdensome issues – like pay equity – challenging the sector, decrepit pay scales for support workers compared to those in other health sector positions was still the most important topic on the agenda. On this, Costante was unable to comment, however.

"It doesn't stop me from listening, though," said Costante.

Nancy Wallace-Gero, executive director of Community Living Essex County, took his cue.

"The wage issue is the most important. We're struggling in a major way to hire and retain qualified staff. We want the government to make a commitment to raising wages," said Wallace-Gero.

With an attendance of more than 800, we hope that the issues raised were heard by our representatives inside the legislature and that this will be a catalyst for change.


